Hawthorne Celebrates 'Knock Out Hunger' Event

Hawthorne Elementary School celebrated its "Knock Out Hunger" event with its annual cereal box domino "serpentine" and other entertainment on Tuesday, Nov. 26.

Students and staff used the better part of November collecting cereal, with classes competing to see who could bring in the most cereal boxes. Donating "Milk Money" also counted toward the competition.

It was reported that last year the school collected just over 1,000 boxes of cereal, so this year they aimed to collect 1,100 boxes. This year, Hawthorne kids and staff brought in 1,582 boxes of cereal, far exceeding the goal. Summer Anderson's class took first place, bringing in 348 boxes, while Colleen Unger's class came in second (205) and Jerika Spencer's class came in third (163).

In a special assembly on Tuesday, staff filled the gym with the cereal, lining the boxes up in a domino run to

be toppled over. The classes sat along the four walls of the room, and children waved black and gold pom poms as they cheered for the event. Principal Mark Looney set

off the domino effect with a simple nudge of the first box, and for the next one to two minutes the entire room chanted "knock it down" as the boxes fell over. But that wasn't the only reward the kids earned for reaching their goal. Darlene Davis, the school's behav-

Responders Handle Three Crashes in Three Hours

Sweet Home fire crews responded to three motor vehicle collisions within a three-hour time span on Tuesday, Nov. 26.

The first crash occurred at 4:30 p.m. on Main Street near the intersection of 23rd Avenue. The crash incurred minor damage to the two vehicles involved, with no injuries

The second crash occurred approximately 30 minutes later at the intersection of Highway 20 and Liberty Road. That crash involved a small sedan and a pickup truck pulling a loaded horse trailer. The driver of the sedan was extricated by firefighters and transported to the hospital by ambulance with serious injuries, but was in stable condition. No other injuries were reported and the horses were also uninjured.

The third crash occurred at approximately 7:20 p.m. on Highway 20 near the intersection of 55th Avenue. This crash involved a full size pickup truck that struck the back of a smaller pickup truck which was traveling in the

same direction. The smaller pickup rolled onto its top in the ditch, with both vehicles sustaining significant damage. During the crash a chain was thrown from one of the pickup beds, tangling in an overhead power line and

bringing that live wire down.
Pacific Power arrived and

Pacific Power arrived and cut power to the wire, which was causing a significant hazard as bystanders walked under it and drove over it on the roadway. Three occupants of the smaller pickup

and the driver of the full size pickup were evaluated by medics, but all refused transport to the hospital by ambulance.

Fire crews were assisted by OSP, ODOT, and Sweet Home PD.

FROM OUR FILES



The first grade students at Oak Heights Elementary School got together in 1974 for a special Thanksgiving celebration. The students prepared a feast of butter, cornbread and pumpkin pudding topped off with apples, raisins and jams to commemorate the annual event.

Dec. 8, 1949

Sweet Home's school district's census between ages 4 and 20 came back with 1,986, an increase over last year's 1,974. The basic reason for the recent and prospective increases in school enrollment is the spectacular increase in the birth rate since 1940. The war babies of 1942 and 1943 are the parents of first and second graders of the current school year. High birth rates in 1948 and 1949 suggest the basic change in the nation's birth rate will continue for some years to come.

Dec. 5, 1974

A pickup truck smashed through the front window of Robertson's Thrift Store, 897 Main St., after colliding with a Volkswagen in front of the store. The only injury reported was to Colleen Day Devlin, 19, who was driving the Volkswagen. She was treated and released from the hospital. The truck driver, Max Lewis Heath, 50, pulled away from the curb and started to make a u-turn when he collided with Devlin and spun into the thrift store.

City Council directed city The final tabulation of staff to add to its proposed new sewer ordinance that homeowners be responsible for groundwater infiltration. Councilman Lawrence Barton said infiltration is a problem the city is facing, and City Manager Dave Crutcher said the new ordinance would help the problem by making the homeowner responsible for their side service connection. The Environmental Protection Agency is holding payment for the city's new wastewater treatment plant until the city passes a comprehensive sewer ordinance. The city estimates 60% of its 1,200 sewer connections are "leakers" that would be subject to action under the suggested ordinance.

Traffic Committee Considers 1st Avenue Issues

The Public & Traffic Safety Committee talked about options for stop signs on 1st Avenue and 12th Avenue during its Nov. 13 meeting.

Chair Frank Gallagher said he'd like to see better and more prominent signs at 1st Avenue and Highway 20 to warn drivers that commercial vehicles are not allowed on 1st Avenue. He believes that the current signs are not large enough or explanatory enough for commercial drivers to realize they shouldn't be driving through there.

Gallagher suggested they also consider the possibility of creating a three-way stop at Nandina Street and 1st Avenue.

"It does meet some of the requirements there for stop signs because it is an intersection with a low-volume entering a high-volume street." he said.

Prior to this meeting, the City Council had decided a more formal process should be followed when it comes to requesting and approving stop signs. Assistant City Manager Cecily Pretty informed the committee about this new rule, adding that

they will consider new stop sign requests once the formal process is outlined.

Interim City Manager Jason Ogden noted that a resident at 12th Avenue and Tamarack Street requested a stop sign at that corner where the streets turn into each other at a 90-degree angle. He recalled he's been to crashes

at that site after drivers took the corner too fast and broke through residents' fencing.

Committee member Joe Graybill said "there is none to little cross traffic" in that area, and "not every corner needs a stop sign," adding that people should slow down and be careful; he doesn't believe the corner needs a stop sign. Ogden would like to discuss

the matter further at the next meeting.

During the Aug. 27 City Council meeting, a motion was approved to install temporary speed tables on 1st Avenue between Highway 20 and Highway 228, with the intent to study how that affects the conditions on the hotly debated road.

Ogden updated The New

Era that the city has been waiting to hire an engineering director who could work on that project. Engineering firms were just approved for hire during the Nov. 12 meet-

In other business, Ogden introduced the city's new traffic officer, Daniel Gerkman, to the committee.






Q: Do I have dry eyes or allergies?

A: Although allergy season is in full swing some people who have allergy type symptoms may in fact have dry eyes. There are specific eye drops for allergies and dry eyes. It's important to use the correct drop or you may make your symptoms worse. Education or evaluation can facilitate the right treatment. 

People with dry eyes either do not produce enough tears or have a poor quality of tears. Dry eye is a common and often chronic problem, particularly in older adults. The primary approaches used to manage and treat dry eyes include adding tears, conserving tears, increasing tear production, and/or treat the inflammation of the eyelids or eye surface that contributes to the dry eyes. Ocular Allergies is the abnormal response of sensitive eyes to contact with allergens and other irritating substances. Pollen in the air is the most common cause of allergy symptoms but other things in the air such as smoke, animal dander or fumes may also trigger an allergic response. The primary approach to manage ocular allergy is avoidance of allergic triggers, cool compresses, eyewash, oral anti-histamines or eye drops specific for allergies. Most eye drops used for dry eyes are mainly used to increase volume of tears. Drops used for ocular allergies have an anti-histamine component, which reduces the effects of histamine but also dry the eye. Using an ocular allergy drop will make a dry eye



Commission Approves Next Phase in Wiley Creek Campus

The Planning Commission 27.52-acre lot into multiple lots situated behind Wiley 21 meeting.

The lot, located at 4901 Hwy. 20, is approximately 1,198,771 square feet. Plans submitted in the application indicate the land owner, Sweet Home Residential LLC, wants to divide the parcel into five lots for development and a larger sixth lot for possible development at a later time.



expressing concern about spawning fish in Wiley Creek. He wrote: "This subdivision is on the border to Wiley Creek which is a spawning location for salmon, steelhead and trout. This property has a large spring and ground water runoff into Wiley Creek. I do not see any catch basins, nor remediation of nitrites which will be introduced to Wiley Creek from this development. I feel this could negatively impact the salmon and steelhead and trout. I ask the City of Sweet Home Planning and Building Department to review this project and determine if this will negatively affect Wiley Creek watershed and take action to protect this natural resource."

Addressing this letter, Randall stated they are "sensitive to the environmental features" and their design is in line with the city's Safe Harbor guidelines, which provides 50-feet setbacks to the riparian areas.

Oregon Rep. Chavez-DeRemer, Trump's pick for labor secretary, says she received bomb threat

The Clackamas County Sheriff's Office confirmed Wednesday that it responded to a threat against U.S. Rep. Lori Chavez-DeRemer, an Oregon Republican selected by president-elect Donald Trump to lead the federal Department of Labor.

Chavez-DeRemer tweeted that she received a pipe bomb threat on Tuesday at her Happy Valley home, and that she and her family were safe.

"This kind of violence harms not just the intended targets but entire communities," she tweeted. "It is an unacceptable way to express opposition, and it will not deter President Trump and the team he has assembled from doing the work on behalf of the American people."

A spokesman for the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office confirmed that the office responded to a

threat and that the FBI is handling an investigation, but declined to answer other questions. A spokesman for Chavez-DeRemer did not immediately respond to

The FBI said in a statement that it was aware of "numerous bomb threats and swatting incidents targeting incoming administration nominees and appointees."

"We take all potential threats seriously and, as always, encourage members of the public to immediately report anything they consider suspicious to law enforcement," the statement contin-

Trump spokeswoman Karoline Leavitt said in a statement that several officials received "violent, un-American" threats ranging from bomb threats to "swatting," a term that describes prank calls intended to cause a large number of heavily armed police officers to show up at an address to respond to a non-existent

Shop Fire Damages Building, Classic Car

Fire crews responded to a shop fire off Mountain View Road on Monday, Nov. 25.

The Sweet Home Fire and Ambulance District responded to the fire after a 911 call was placed at 12:30 p.m. A command vehicle carrying a water tank and pump arrived within four minutes and began a defensive attack on the fire from the exterior of the building until other units arrived. Soon after, an engine, a medic unit, and a ladder truck arrived on scene. The engine company made entry into the structure knocking the fire down, then requesting removal of a rollup door in order to remove a classic vehicle from the structure to salvage it from any further damage from heat and firefighting operations.

The vehicle, a 1931 Ford Model A, was removed from the structure, but it was found to have already sustained damage. The fire was knocked down by 12:47 p.m., and crews worked to overhaul the structure to ensure that the fire was completely extinguished.




